Attached is our slash hazard sheet that was developed by Rich McMillan, the District Forester in the Clearwater.

Below are the suggestions I have for the Fire Protection and Hazard Reduction rules:

05. Director. The director of the Idaho Department of Lands or his authorized representative.

110. BURNING OF SLASH.

O1. Permits. Any burning operation conducted for the purpose of hazard reduction must be accordance with the law requiring burning permits during the closed fire season. Persons conducting burni operations must have sufficient men, tools and equipment on hand to immediately stop the uncontrolled spread any fire. Burning operations must be planned, prepared and executed in such a manner way that forest resources a not damaged and air quality standards are met.

ostandards required for a clearance, but has completed some hazard reduction work, that the contractor can dischat the remainder of his hazard obligation by returning a portion of his bond to the district and paying an additional to transfer liability. Use the following formula: [One minus (the acceptable hazard point or five, divided by residual, or untreated hazard points)] multiply that ratio times the slash rate. This dollar amount should be multiple by the total volume removed from the contract area. Add to that the additional fee to transfer liability (for untreated hazard points, from Table III) times the total volume. When this amount is paid to the State the contract area can be cleared. Which can also be expressed as:

(1-(5/U)) * B * V + (A*V) = Formula to transfer liability for a partially completed job.

140. CERTIFICATE OF CLEARANCE.

The Certificate of Clearance is the instrument used to certify that hazard reduction has been was accomplished, contract entered intoentered with the Director director to ensure hazard management, or an additional fee has been was paid. Anyone who has been issued an Agreement for the cutting of any forest product or potential fore product and who has met the standards outlined in Section 120, or has made payment for hazard reduction under contract with the Director director, as provided in Section 38-404, Idaho Code, or has paid an additional fee accordance with Section 38-122, Idaho Code, must apply in writing to the Director director for a Certificate Clearance. Within thirty (30) days after receipt of such writtenthe request for a Certificate of Clearance, the Director director or his designee will enuse inspect the area covered by the request to be inspected. If it is found that the fit hazard has been was properly disposed of, the Director director will issue a Certificate of Clearance. The Certificate of Clearance must be substantially the same form as is on Department of Lands Form No. 760 - "Certificate Clearance."
