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Hello Mr. Zanzig,

My brief closing statement is as follows:

The Finney pilings were illegally installed without a permit violating state statute 58-1301. They do not meet the legal setback requirements or the encroachment standards, and therefore we request their application be denied, and the pilings removed.

They Finneys have falsely represented their reason for installing the pilings. They've stated, the pilings were installed to protect me and guide boats. They are not needed for either of their purported reasons. The actual reason they were installed, was to moor their personal houseboat. In an effort to be neighborly, avoid a contentious hearing, and to prevent wasting everyone's time, we offered a compromise to allow the commercial function stated by the Finneys, but prohibited other uses. They declined. The pilings have allowed and will continue to allow a commercial operation to not only encroach within the legally required 25-foot setback, but far beyond the riparian line.

The Finneys had every opportunity prior to the sale of their property to legally install any encroachments desired, within legal setbacks, and with a permit. They did not. They sold the property, profited, and then snuck the pilings in after closing. The behavior is illegal and immoral and should not be tolerated by the IDL. Not one but both neighboring property owners have filed objections to the commercial navigational encroachment application to keep the illegally installed pilings, and we request the application be denied.

Ms. Finney:

I have a few things to add to Ms. Maneck's response to your questions.
