What is Good Neighbor Authority?



Good Neighbor Authority (GNA) allows states to enter into cooperative agreements with federal agencies to achieve restoration and resilient landscape objectives across ownership boundaries.


Why are "we" doing GNA?

To Increase Pace & Scale of Forest & Watershed Restoration on Federal Lands through Active Management

Benefits:

- Improves forest health
- Reduces fuels and threats to communities and watersheds from catastrophic wildfires
- Creates more jobs and economic benefits by providing more fiber to Idaho forest products markets







What has been done?

- HFRA Designations Accepted (May 2014)
- Passage of SCR 126 (March 2015)
- 2017 GNA Funding/Decision Unit (FTEs & Spending Authority)
- Signed Master GNA Agreement & 3 Supplemental Project Agreements (SPAs) (2016)
- Sold First GNA Timber Sale Wapiti
- Other GNA Project Work Completed
